**Better FloodSafe than Sorry** 

#### How to draw up your Emergency Flood Plan

- 1 First, learn what your flood risk is (local flood history)
- 2 Prepare your Emergency Flood Plan with all members of the household present in advance of a flood.
- Here is a checklist which will assist you to list the things you need to do prior to, during and after a flood.
- 4 Once you have completed your plan, practise it regularly and keep it in a safe and easily accessible place for quick reference (e.g. in your Emergency Flood Kit).

#### Prior to a flood

Stay informed by listening for Bureau of Meteorology flood watches and warnings on ABC 891 radio.

Always keep an eye on the weather, unusually heavy rain is a good indication that flooding may occur.

- Learn your flood risk
- Prepare your home
- Prepare your emergency flood kit (eg drinking water & food, medications, first aid kit, waterproof clothing & bags, important documents & photos, contact numbers & phone, portable radio, torch & spare batteries, candles & waterproof matches)
