Training:

Cost:

Most cadet programs do not have a joining fee or any associated membership costs. However some activities may require a participation fee.

Uniform:

Cadets are provided with their uniform or personal protective equipment (PPE) made up of overalls, helmet, goggles and gloves. It is the responsibility of the cadet to enure they wear the right footwear.

Parent/quardian support:

Cadets may take part in special activities. There is an expectation that you might be able to offer your help from time to time in the form of supervision.


